Dear Board of Parole Hearings,

Thank you for the opportunity to address the Board regarding the administrative review of inmate Vincent Rudolph Jiron AS6592, and his suitability for early release.

Based on my knowledge of the case against Inmate Jiron, I do not believe he should be considered for release prior to serving out his sentence. This is based not only on the facts of the case arising in his commitment to CDCR, but also based on his prior convictions, which show a history of serious criminal conduct.

In Yolo County case 11-2724, Inmate Jiron had recently been terminated from a pizza restaurant when he decided to vandalize the restaurant by breaking out the front window with rocks. He was chased down on the scene and found to be in possession of methamphetamine.

In Yolo County case 13-3650, Inmate Jiron was on probation for narcotics sales related offenses when his residence was searched pursuant to his probation status. Said search produced multiple grams of methamphetamine and marijuana along with packaging materials, scales and several stolen cell phones.

Inmate Jiron plead to possession for sale of methamphetamine while being on probation for a related methamphetamine offense.


Given the above facts, Inmate Jiron would not be suitable for early release. His crime in the instant case was serious and showed an utter disregard for the law or public safety. For those reasons alone, he should remain in prison. However, Inmate Jiron's previous offenses also show that he should remain in custody.

Inmate Jiron has been convicted of Felonies numerous times in his life spanning decades. Many of Inmate Jiron's are not narcotics sales related, but rather theft and vandalism; however, the most egregious conviction on Inmate Jiron's record has yet to be mentioned.

In March of 1994, Inmate Jiron was convicted of First Degree Burglary, a strike offense, in Sacramento County.

While his current conviction for Possession for Sale of Methamphetamine may not be deemed serious by some, Inmate Jiron has, for the past few decades, lived by his own rules and shown a disregard for the safety and well-being of those around him. Given the seriousness of this offense, the seriousness of some of his past convictions, and his lengthy criminal record, he should not be considered for early release as a "non-violent second striker".
