Dear Board of Parole Hearings:

Thank you for the opportunity to address the Board regarding the administrative review of immate Michael Moore, and his suitability for early release.

Mr. Moore was born on an analysis and is currently 56 years old. Mr. Moore has a lengthy criminal history including crimes of violence. Between his criminal history and the facts of the case for which he is currently incarcerated, Mr. Moore is not a suitable candidate for early release.

In 1981, when Mr. Moore was in his early 20s he was convicted of Second Degree Burglary and committed to the California Youth Authority. Mr. Moore was discharged from the Youth Authority in 1985. In the late 1980s/early 1990s, Mr. Moore acquired a number of misdemeanor convictions involving auto theft and assault. In 1993, Moore was convicted of First Degree Burglary and sentenced to the California Department of Corrections for 4 years.

Mr. Moore violated parole in 1996, 1997, and 1998, each time returning to custody to finish his term. In 1999, he was convicted of misdemeanor spousal abuse and returned to custody. In 2000, Mr. Moore was convicted of forging vehicle registration and returned to custody. In 2001-2003, Mr. Moore violated parole and each time was returned to CDC to finish his term. In 2004, Mr. Moore was convicted of felony spousal abuse and sentenced to prison for 3 years. In 2006, Mr. Moore was convicted of spousal abuse and sentenced to prison for 2 years.

Upon release from prison, Mr. Moore was living in West Sacramento. On April 9, 2009, at approximately 2am, Mr. Moore entered the occupied apartment of a neighbor and stole the neighbor's wallet and cell phone. During this burglary, a room mate of the victim had awoken and gone into the kitchen to get something to drink. While in the kitchen, the room mate heard a noise and turned around to find Mr. Moore standing behind him in the living room. Moore grabbed the victim's wallet off the

computer desk and ran out of the residence. The victim's property was later discovered in Mr. Moore's residence.

The defendant pled to a First Degree Burglary, admitted a strike for a prior first degree burglary, and admitted two prison priors. He was sentenced to 10 years in the Department of Corrections.

Since his early 20s, Mr. Moore has spent a majority of his life in prison. When released from custody on parole, he violated and was returned. When he was released from parole, he committed new law violations and returned to custody on new terms. Aside from the plethora of misdemeanor convictions he as accrued during his lifetime, Mr. Moore has been convicted of felony spousal abuse and twice has been convicted of First Degree Burglary.

Mr. Moore has an extensive criminal history, and at the age of 56, his prospects to lead a law abiding life seem low. For the protection of the public, Mr. Moore should be required to serve his full sentence, and should not be considered for early release.
