Dear Board of Parole Hearings,

Thank you for the opportunity to address the Board regarding the administrative review of inmate Isidro Jaramillo, Jr., AZ3799, and his suitability for early release.

Based on my knowledge of the case against inmate Jaramillo, I do not believe he should be considered for release prior to serving out his sentence. This is based not only on the facts of the case arising in his commitment to CDCR, but also based on his prior convictions, which show a history of serious and repetitive criminal conduct.

In the instant case inmate Jaramillo was found to be in possession of a victim's automobile by the victim himself. Inmate Jaramillo ran when questioned by victim only to be photographed by an independent witness, which ultimately lead to his arrest.

While the instant case does not shock the conscious as to viciousness or violence, Inmate Jaramillo's previous offenses also show that he should remain in custody.

Inmate Jaramillo has been convicted of Felonies multiple times in his life spanning multiple decades and states. Most of his convictions are for theft related offenses, including a First Degree Burglary conviction from January 9, 2006, for which Inmate Jaramillo was originally sentenced to prison; however, due to his inability to stop getting arrested for other theft crimes (including felonies) he was sent to prison in 2010. In case there is the mistaken belief that inmate Jaramillo is not "violent" offender, please keep in mind that inmate Jaramillo also has a conviction for domestic violence battery in 2013.

While stealing a vehicle is not a "serious" or "violent" offense as defined in the penal code, it is certainly a serious offense, Mr. Valdes has, for the couple few decades, lived by his own rules and shown a disregard for the safety and well-being of those around him. Given the seriousness

of this offense, the seriousness of some of his past convictions, and his lengthy criminal record, he should not be considered for early release as a "non-violent second striker".
