19 Plaintiff, THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA (hereinafter “Plaintiff” or “the
20 People”), hereby allege the following upon information and belief.

21 **PARTIES**

22 1. Plaintiff brings this action by and through Jeff W. Reisig, District Attorney of Yolo
23 County.

24 2. Plaintiff, acting to protect the public from unlawful and unfair business practices,
25 brings this civil action in the name of the People of the State of California pursuant to Business and
26 Professions Code section 17200 et seq.

27 3. Defendant WALMART STORES, INC. (hereinafter “Walmart” or “Defendant”), is a
28 Delaware corporation with its principal place of business in Bentonville, Arkansas. At all times

1 relevant, Defendant owned and operated four (4) retail store locations in and throughout Yolo
2 County, California.

3 4. When reference is made herein to any act or omission of Defendant, such allegation
4 shall include the acts or omissions of Defendant's officers, agents and employees, and that each of
5 them engaged in said acts or omissions.

6 **JURISDICTION AND VENUE**

7 5. This Court has jurisdiction over Defendant as all causes of action asserted in this
8 Complaint arise out of Defendant's conduct in Yolo County, California.

9 6. Venue is proper in this Court under Code of Civil Procedure section 395.5 as all
10 unlawful acts alleged herein were committed in Yolo County, California.

11 **APPLICABLE LAW**

12 7. Following a declared State of Emergency due to the Coronavirus pandemic, on or
13 about April 3, 2020, Governor Gavin Newsom issued and signed Executive Order N-44-20 (hereafter
14 "Executive Order") concerning price gouging throughout the State of California.

15 8. The Executive Order went into effect on April 4, 2020 and, in part, prohibits the sale
16 or offer of sale of certain goods at a price greater than 10% above the price charged by that seller on
17 February 4, 2020.

18 9. Food items fall within the Executive Order's purview.

19 10. There are exemptions, however, to the Executive Order's limitations. For example, a
20 price increase greater than 10% is not unlawful if the seller can prove the increase was directly
21 attributable to additional costs imposed on the seller by suppliers of the item, and the price is no
22 more than 10% greater than the total of the cost to the seller plus the customary markup applied on
23 the applicable February date.

24 11. Each sale or offer to sell in violation of the Executive Order constitutes a separate
25 violation and, as made clear by the Executive Order's terms, each violation is an unlawful business
26 practice under Business and Professions Code section 17200 et seq.

27 12. Similarly, Penal Code section 396 prohibits price gouging and provides that upon a
28 declared state of emergency it is unlawful to sell or offer to sell consumer food items at a price of

1 more than 10% greater than the price charged by that person for those food items immediately prior
2 to the proclamation or declaration of emergency, or prior to a date set in the proclamation or
3 declaration. (Pen. Code, § 396(b).)

4 13. Penal Code section 396 allows for certain exceptions: the higher price is not unlawful
5 if the seller can prove it is directly attributable to additional costs imposed by the supplier of that
6 item and the price is no more than 10% greater than the total cost to the seller plus the seller's
7 customary markup in the usual course of business immediately prior to the state or local emergency.
8 (*Ibid.*)

9 **GENERAL ALLEGATIONS**

10 14. Defendant's retail locations offer grocery items for sale, with Defendant's own brand
11 (known as "Great Value") of eggs regularly stocked and sold at its locations. Walmart sells its Great
12 Value brand eggs in units of 12, 18, 36 and 60-count large eggs as well as 12-count extra-large eggs
13 (hereinafter "Products").

14 15. The Products are sold at each of Defendant's four store locations in Yolo County.

15 16. An investigation, which encompassed the time frame of April 4, 2020 to July 3, 2020,
16 revealed that on numerous occasions between May 1, 2020 and June 9, 2020, at all four store
17 locations in Yolo County, Defendant sold its Products at prices that exceeded the limitations imposed
18 by Executive Order N-44-20 and Penal Code section 396.

19 **FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION**

20 **Violations of Business and Professions Code section 17200 et seq.**

21 **(Unfair Competition Law)**

22 17. The People restate and incorporate all previous paragraphs as though fully set forth
23 herein.

24 18. Business and Professions Code section 17200 prohibits unfair competition—meaning
25 any unlawful, unfair, or fraudulent business act or practice.

26 19. A violation of the Executive Order is enforceable under Business and Professions
27 Code section 17200. (Governor's Exec. Order No. N-44-20, (April 4, 2020) paragraph 4.)

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
